Market Use is on the Rise

As grocery prices continue to escalate, the demand for healthy and accessible food for families and individuals in Wyandotte County continues to rise. We are fighting to keep the struggling community fed while maintaining Cross-Lines' bottom line.

In just the first seven months of 2022, **the Community** Market has served 26,526 individuals. We have already surpassed 2021's record of 26,057! As Wyandotte County's vulnerable community is feeling the effects of rising prices, the Community Market is also. Marlen Hernandez, Hunger Relief Manager, states, **"I am** stressed about the prices of our products going up and our shopper numbers rising. Some of our past suppliers cannot provide for us anymore because they also feel the effects of increased prices."


The Community Market staff is seeing the effects of rising prices and inflation every day.

"As prices of the products on our shelves continue to increase, we are feeling the stress of not being able to provide the things we have in the past for our clients," said Marione Rangel, Community Market Assistant. The Market is currently serving over 4,000 people per month. LaShaunda Willis, a frequent shopper, says, "I am on a fixed income, and I love to come to the Community Market in the months my family needs it. It is so helpful to come and grab household needs each month. I always tell people in similar situations as me about the Market."

Summer Heat: Cross-Lines Opens Cooling Center

With a **severe heat wave** affecting most of the country in late July, Cross-Lines leadership quickly coordinated the opening of our sanctuary to serve as a cooling center for those in need of a space to stay safe from dangerous temperatures. Scorching weather poses a significant threat to those experiencing homelessness, with adverse health effects possibly arising in just a few short hours in the heat.



Director of Programs Rob Santel shared, "As we were looking at what options were available for folks in this extreme heat, we found almost none, especially on the weekends in Wyandotte County. We knew we needed to be responsive to community needs. We have already lost eight individuals among the unsheltered population to heat-related deaths this season. We knew we needed to provide a place for people to stay hydrated and escape the elements."
