Fighting Hunger with Dignity

As hunger has continued to grow in the community, Cross-Lines has responded to meet the need by transforming our former Thrift Store space into the Community Market.

The Cross-Lines Community Market is an innovative approach to providing struggling families in Wyandotte County with healthy, fresh groceries to help fight hunger in our community, where more than 21% of residents are food insecure. For children, the rate has ballooned from 23% to more than 32% during the Covid-19 pandemic, which means nearly

one in every three children in Wyandotte County is at risk for hunger. Before Cross-Lines created and opened the Community Market in July 2021, we ran a traditional food pantry, where people received a box of food items. The pantry served more than 22,000 people in 2020.

As the pandemic continues and people are still struggling, food insecurity is still an ongoing problem. The Community Market primarily serves people who are living

at 150% of the federal poverty level and below. The Community Market is a deliberate shift away from a traditional food pantry to a more inclusive program where clients are shoppers empowered to choose the items they need most.

"We have a lot of people who do work, who are employed, but they are just barely making it," said Susila Jones, Cross-Lines Executive Director. "We want to continue to be that stop gap so that people don't have to decide between buying healthy food and paying rent."

Cross-Lines wanted to offer clients a more dignified experience by providing a grocery store-like environment where they can choose the foods most appropriate for their family. The market is a bright, cheery space with lime green walls, large wall decals of fresh vegetables with bright windows and well-stocked and organized shelves. Shoppers are greeted at a welcome desk before getting their cart and beginning their trip up and down the wide aisles.

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"So often, food pantries are just stuck in a basement somewhere, and they're not a place anybody wants to go," said Jones. "We want to create a space that people want to come to and kids feel like they're just going to a grocery store and not like they're going to a food pantry."

Like any typical grocery store, a section filled with baskets near the front of the Community Market hold a wide variety of fresh produce such as ears of corn, tomatoes, carrots, peppers, potatoes and cilantro.

Aisles are neatly stocked with cereals, dried and canned goods, peanut butter and a variety of beans. Large glass-front refrigerators hold meat, milk,

butter and eggs. There are full-size toiletry necessities such as shampoo, soap, toothpastes, toothbrushes and deodorant. The market also has cleaning supplies, paper towels, diapers and toilet paper.

Shoppers can come once a month and use points based on their household size. The points allow shoppers to get enough food for

approximately 10 meals. For example, a household of 1-2 has 30 points and can get two full plastic bags of fresh produce as well as other items including meat, eggs, butter and canned goods.

The Market also offers items relevant to a person's culture. For instance, the market carries Hispanic food items like mole, beans and Tajin seasoning.

In addition to increasing access to healthy foods and promoting dignity and respect, the Community Market decreases food waste because our shoppers choose exactly what they need instead of getting a pre-made box of food that may contain food that their family cannot use.



In December 2021, the Cross-Lines Christmas Store will provide 250 Wyandotte County families with the opportunity to shop for Christmas gifts for their family.

Each family will receive new clothes, toys, household items, groceries, and gift cards. Our hope is to provide families with joy, as well as the dignity and respect of choosing and gifting brand new presents to their families.

Cross-Lines also gives McDonalds gift cards to people experiencing homelessness.

Cross-Lines is collecting new coats and \$20 Walmart and \$10 McDonalds gift cards for this year's Christmas Store. Monetary donations are also gladly accepted.

Donations should be delivered to Cross-Lines by November 22, 2021.
